Assess the Learning: Questions to Ask the Students Following the Program

For each story: What was the setting? Who were the characters? What was the lesson? If you could have a wish, what would you wish for? (Or be more specific: for example, What thing (material possession) would you wish for? What do you wish you could do or be? What would you wish for our class, our school, the world?)

Extend the Learning: Post-Show Activities

Have the students make a simple shadow puppet using card stock or file folders. Templates and instructions can be downloaded from our website:

Use an overhead projector, or just hold them in front of a flashlight to see them on the wall. The children can act out the story of the Knee-High Man.

Have the children draw or write about something they wish they could do.
